Dear Parents, Students, Staff and Friends of the Magdalene Community,

Last Sunday night a number of students in Years 9 and 10 along with their parents and staff attended the 5.30pm Sunday evening Mass at St Paul's Camden. Their presence at Mass provided an opportunity for the school to highlight our role as part of the parish and as active members of the wider church. Although numbers attending the Mass were small it is important that school and parish work closely together in the faith development of young people and this was a time where this was reflected practically. I thank the students, families and teachers who attended the Mass, to highlight their membership of both the parish and Magdalene community.

Last Monday the Acting Director of Schools in the Wollongong Diocese Mrs Carolyn Hadley visited Magdalene. Members of the Magdalene community will be involved in reading at each Station as well as helping with parking. This is another opportunity for Magdalene to be involved in the wider Church. I thank every person who has volunteered to be involved in the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday. I also encourage everyone to be part of the Stations of the Cross ceremony which begins on Friday at 8.45am.

They also provide an opportunity for parents to have an idea of what is going well and what may need attention. 

From the Religious Education Coordinator

Last year I was cleaning my pool after trimming my side hedges. I was fully clothed with long sleeves and jeans, gloves, shoes, a hat and sunglasses, because the sap from the vines is very difficult to clean off the skin. As I swept the pool for leaves I leant over to scoop up a spider and I fell into the deep end of the pool. Having suffered numerous humiliating falls in my life I decided to pretend that I meant to do it and spent the next 10 minutes walking around inside the pool, fully clothed, cleaning out more of the leaves.

When I left the pool I went to the garage roller door, hoping that none of the neighbours would see me, soaking wet in all my clothes, hat and sunglasses. But as I fumbled for the garage remote I heard the neighbour across the road call out: "Lovely day isn't it?"

I couldn't help wondering what kind of a lovely day it would be where someone would consider going into the pool fully clothed, and I wondered if she went inside to discuss the possibility of moving house with her husband, into a more sensible neighbourhood, where people owned swimming costumes. I quickly attempted to open the garage door but realised that the remote was not working. It took a few seconds to realise that this was probably because it had been in my pocket and had spent 10 minutes under water.

Things don't always work out the way we plan them in life, and sometimes the consequences are much more serious than simply the mild embarrassment of falling into a pool. Most of us were baptised as infants or adults, and the waters of Baptism washed away our sins and enabled us to enter into a life in the Spirit: no matter how many times we have fallen or how serious our fall has been, we can receive the forgiveness of God. This is made possible because of the death and resurrection of Jesus, which we will celebrate this Easter. "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade" (1Peter: 3-4).

Let us all enjoy our personal and family time this Easter and let us not forget the religious and spiritual dimension to this time of the year. It is a time to reflect on where we are in our relationship with the one who died to save us and who is risen and is calling us on to an ever deeper friendship.

Mrs Hadley had discussions with the teams about the role each of them played in making it to the National Final, the design process of the car and Gamma Rayzing's current plans for the World Finals in Abu Dhabi.

Mrs Hadley was very excited about the project and praised the students on their dedication to excellence within the program whilst still working to the best of their ability within the classroom. She encouraged the teams to maintain their passion and said that she hoped to see their progress in the lead up to Abu Dhabi.

After morning tea, the teams then raced their cars against one another in a fast paced and exciting moment of friendly competition. Falcon Racing and Gamma Rayzing would like to thank Mrs Carolyn Hadley and Mr Alan McManus along with Mr John Lo Cascio for taking the time to visit them and see their projects from the Australian National Finals.



YEAR 9 Excursion to ANSTO (Australian Nuclear Science & Technology Organisation)

On 14 March we visited the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO). There were two parts to the day. The first was when we went to learn about the nuclear reactor. It is a very delicate piece of equipment and our entry may have interfered with it. We saw the particle accelerator. The visit was to teach us more about how nuclear science is helping with medicine and the treatment of cancer. As well as learning about how radiation can harm and heal people. We also looked at the section where many scientists around the world come to work with the unique and extraordinary machinery.



The second part of the day was when we learnt about the periodic table and how particles and isotopes are made. Dave, our instructor quizzed us on some of the elements of the Periodic table. Dave was the best part of the day. Dave wore a tie-dyed lab coat and if that doesn't explain how cool he is we don't know what will. He spoke in a way we understood and rewarded us with Mentos. We had to count how many protons and neutrons there were and find which element of the periodic table it was. We then were able to see Mentos react with Pepsi, and then create Elephant toothpaste.

Personal highlights:

Thomas Carroll "I found the excursion to ANSTO interesting as it taught a lot about nuclear power and how it can be used for the right things as well as it taught about how radiation and nuclear medicine can be used to cure cancer and other forms of disease, I also learnt about the different isotopes on the periodic table as well as the atomic mass of particles for example a particle with an atomic mass of 1 is hydrogen."

Mikayla Cummins: This excursion was a fun and interesting experience. It was very educational and was a great way to learn new things about nuclear reactors. It was a really good day.

Elizabeth Arcadi: It was very educational but fun at the same time. I liked seeing the nuclear reactor on the TV but it would have been more fun if we could have seen it for real or the TV being bigger. The best part of the day for me was when Lexi and Tom did the experiment outside.

Alexandra Willis: The excursion to the ANSTO facilities was awesome. We got to see science in action and how it is used in a real life situation. The experiments and 'Proton Power Pellets' (Mentos) were really fun and a good way to learn the theory behind what we saw.

Alex Nies: "This excursion gave us an insight of what has been happening in nuclear science and medicines."

Annicka Ciol: During the lecture we had a man named Dave talk to us all about neutrons, electrons and protons. He then tested our knowledge which allowed us to learn more about what we had seen throughout the day.

Jesse Marchand: The excursion gave us a very broad insight of how nuclear reactors can be used for more than just power generation. It also gave us an idea on how everyday objects are trying to be more efficient and environmentally friendly. It was very insightful on how nuclear power is used to research improvement in everyday life.

Chloe Mortimer: "The excursion gave us a broad perspective on the way nuclear reactors work, seeing examples of how science works in real life circumstances. The excursion would have been more informative and easier to understand if we had visited ANSTO further into the topic."

Cameron Mills: The excursion was very interesting and informative. I learnt so much on how nuclear reactors work and their function. I don't think they noticed the missing uranium.

Tim Stepanov: I enjoyed the excursion as I had never been there before, and it was interesting how much a small nuclear reactor can produce so much nuclear medicine for not only Australia, but for around the world.

Their bodies were subjected to forces that altered their steady state of motion (Newton's 1st Law). They were accelerated in the positive and negative as result of centrifugal and gravitational forces (Newton's 2nd Law) and finally they experienced the effects of inertia and momentum as their bodies resisted changes of direction (Newton's 3rd Law). The learning from this activity will continue in class as we draw on the students' physical experiences on the rides.
